OVERVIEW

The BA in English Language Arts and Reading Middle and Secondary is designed to prepare students to teach ELAR in middle and secondary classrooms in a variety of settings including public, charter, and private schools. Additionally, it includes a pathway to Texas State Educator Certification. Students in the ELAR Middle and Secondary Education degree program take courses designed to develop content proficiency in all areas taught by English Language Arts and Reading teachers in grades 7 through 12. The program includes extensive field experience in classrooms representing varied settings as well as a clinical teaching experience during the final semester.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Graduates of the ELAR Middle and Secondary program who have completed all program and certification requirements are qualified and certified to teach English, Language Arts, and Reading in grade levels 7 through 12. Additionally, graduates have additional training in teaching English language learners and the opportunity for ESL Supplemental certification.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

The ELAR Middle and Secondary degree is part of the Teacher Education Program. Upon completing 60 hours of credit, students must apply to be admitted to the Teacher Education program. Program requirements are detailed in the academic catalog. Some courses in the degree plan require program approval prior to enrollment. These courses include:
