

Every year the **Texas Education Agency (TEA)** asks first-year teachers to fill out a survey. One of the questions asked is how prepared they felt for their first year of teaching. Over 90% of those first-year teachers who graduated from SAGU answered that they felt prepared as a direct result of SAGU's educator prep program.

"That speaks loudly to me," said Dr. Khristy Strange, Interim Chair for the SAGU Education Department. "I work with some amazing professors who help prepare students for the mission field of education. It's a difficult job but ever so rewarding."

In addition, many of our Teacher Ed. alumni have advanced into administrative roles and become principals. In the city of Waxahachie alone, six school principals are SAGU alumni with more throughout Ellis County and the state.

"We view teacher and administrator preparation as a collective endeavor that gives a solid foundation for our students to achieve their aspirations, be successful in their careers, and make a difference in our rapidly changing society," says Dr. Taylor.

In order to prepare more teachers to serve locally, SAGU launched an Alternative Teacher Certification Program in 2018. The department also redesigned the Education Leadership degree program for both public and Christian schools.

Dr. Strange shares that even bigger plans are on the horizon. With the program's continued growth and committed faculty, we are excited about its impact on the future and the next generation!

Academic Scholarships – A significant increase has been approved positioning us to be more competitive in attracting academically qualified students.

Need-based Scholarships – Additional increase to this critical scholarship area will benefit more families.

Ministries Major Scholarship – Our owning districts have long expressed concern over our ministry majors graduating with excessive debt, preventing them from accepting positions with modest salaries in rural areas, for example. I am thrilled to report these district leaders have committed to funding a new 50% tuition guarantee for ministry majors living in the dorms. After factoring all aid a student is eligible for, the districts have committed to assist in making up the difference up to 50%.

When passion meets God's purpose, the world can change. Through these exciting new initiatives, our degrees will be more accessible for the next generation of world-changers!

AG Districts Create SAGU Church Ministry Degree Scholarship

SAGU's affiliated Assemblies of God Districts are excited to provide a generous scholarship for the University's current and incoming church ministry majors. Starting Fall 2020, all oncampus students pursuing a bachelor's in church ministry can receive 50 to 100 percent off tuition!

"Our church ministry students are passionate about making an impact for the Kingdom of God," says Dr. Kermit Bridges, President of SAGU. "Through this initiative led by the AG Districts, our church ministry degrees will be more accessible and affordable."

"We believe this initiative will help provide a way for the next generation of ministers, many of whom prefer a traditional college experience but have been forced to consider non-traditional options due to finances."

Each ministry major can receive from over \$5,000 to \$10,000 per semester in grants and scholarships. The minimum 50 percent off tuition guarantee includes all types of scholarships and grants from all sources. A student's Pell grant, TEG grant, academic scholarship, and all other types of scholarships and grants from SAGU or through the

FAFSA are considered part of the 50 percent guarantee. In addition to the 50 percent off tuition, recipients are still eligible to receive other scholarships and grants allowing them to be awarded up to 100 percent off tuition.

To qualify, a student must be a declared major in one of the fifteen undergraduate church ministry degrees and enrolled full-time as an on-campus student.

In addition, new students must affirm a call to vocational ministry and submit a 500-word essay articulating their calling.

Jeff Francis, SAGU's Senior Director of Financial Aid, believes this initiative can be a crucial deciding factor for students debating whether or not to receive ministerial training and a liberal arts education at SAGU.

"I'm most excited that we are increasing more financial aid towards the students that need it the most," says Francis. "Our goal is to prepare students with a Christ-centered education so that they can go anywhere God calls them to go and do anything God calls them to do. This initiative will help more students be able to receive that education."

SAGU Offers New Master of Theological Studies (MTS) Degree

SAGU is excited to announce the new Master of Theological Studies (MTS) degree program which begins this Fall.

The 51 credit hour program offers an alternative, streamlined route for those desiring to pursue a Ph.D. in Bible or Theology as opposed to the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) degree which ranges from 72 to 90 credit hours.

"The M.Div. is a degree purposely broad in its coverage and it contains a substantial practical theology component," stated Dr. Bruce Rosdahl, SAGU's Department Chair for Bible and Theology. "The MTS, on the other hand, is focused in the field of one's doctoral pursuit."

The MTS has the academic rigor and language requirements needed for most Ph.D. programs in Bible or Theology. It requires two years of biblical language study and the development and successful defense of a thesis. Students can choose

a specialization in either Biblical Studies or Theology.

This degree is widely considered as an ideal option for individuals particularly interested in serving as teaching or resource pastors, part of a preaching team, or university professors.

MTS students will learn how to:

- Interpret and apply Scripture employing responsible hermeneutical principles.
- Explain orthodox Christian theology, including Pentecostal distinctives.
- Translate biblical Hebrew or Greek commensurate with two years of language.

"This degree will further SAGU efforts in preparing individuals to be faithful teachers and expositors of God's Word; whether that be in the classroom, the pulpit, or the mission-field around the world," said Dr. Rosdahl.

I decided against going to college and SAGU after high school and instead, joined the U.S. Army in 2014.
