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An Apology

We regret that unexpected and unusual circumstances such as an unprecedented cold winter, and an increase in the cost of publishing have prevented us from printing this paper often as we intended.

However we have not been idle but have been collecting material and preparing for the continuance of the paper in other ways. Pioneers

We wish our readers had a mental picture of the little group of students who appeared on the 22nd of October, 1927, the opening day of Southwestern Bible School, and contrast this group with the splendid student body of 364 students enrolled this year from sixteen states of the union and Canada. The first graduating class is larger than the group which came together that opening day.

This class consists of real pioneers. When they entered the school building was in bad condition. No light, water or heat in the building, and only a few rooms had been papered and prepared.

The class averted a smallpox epidemic the first year by a night of prayer. The prayer for funds to carry us through the first year, which was one of trouble and trial, and God answered.

Prayer carried us through the second year in real victory, and in the third year gave us a splendid new building in use as a dormitory for men, and a dining room for the school. Prayer enabled us to improve the Tabernacle, last year, at a cost of nine hundred dollars, and now to add a large addition. Prayer enabled this graduating class to go through many tests and trials, and to help us found one of the largest Bible schools in Pentecost. The institution stands as a memorial of the faith, the fidelity, the loyalty and the sacrifices of the teachers and students, and particularly of the CLASS OF 1930.

The First Commencement

The exercises will be combined with a state convention and an interstate rally of the Christ's Ambassadors, May fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh.

For the day services the Enid Gospel Tabernacle, adjoining the main building of the Bible school, and for the four big nights the Chamber of Commerce has secured for us the beautiful and spacious Education Building Auditorium.

Sunday night, May fourth, Superintendent Hugh M. Cadwalder, of Texas, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon.

Monday night, May fifth, will be "Missionary night"...

Tuesday night, May sixth, "Consecration

night".

Wednesday night, May 7, will be "Commencement night".

During these days a number of well known speakers will be heard. Friends of the institution, leaders in state and national Pentecostal work, and missionaries from foreign lands are to be with us. Delegates are expected from states as far east as Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois, and from states as far west as California. This promises to be one of the most notable gatherings of Pentecostal people in the history of the movement. So far as possible free lodging will be provided, for the delegates, and meals will be served on the freewill offering plan.

Commencement Program

The full program has not been announced, but the following representatives of the class will give addresses.

Besides these addresses there will be a feast of musical numbers, both vocal and instrumental, under the direction of Mrs. F. J. Dake.

President Nelson will give a brief address and award certificates to the first and the second year students, and diplomas to the graduating class.

Four evangelistic campaigns have been held. The first, already mentioned, was held by Evangelist Goben and closed early in January. This was followed by W. T. McMullan's campaign which was held in the midst of a severe cold weather. Brother David Burris, of Arkansas, held a brief but helpful campaign emphasizing building the Sunday School, and more recently Dr. Lilian B. Yeomans of California was with us again for evening evangelistic services and morning chapel lecture on divine healing.

Seniors Move For-ward

The Seniors have been busy making plans and quietly carrying them out. These include having their pictures taken, buying pins and rings, and having a number of informal gatherings.

Miss Audra McCamey entertained the third year class at the home of Mrs. Nettie Wilkinson, Wednesday, March 19, all reported a good time, not only socially but spiritually.

There was another meeting of the class at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Harding, Wednesday, April 2, at which time the engagement of two of our most popular seniors, William Edward Davis

and Miss Helen Harding, was announced.

A number of debates have been held
by the Seniors in their Parlimentary
Law class.

The Senior class, numbering about 20, as well as the members of the other classes, are going forth from this school to work for their Master. Many of them have already had successful evangelistic and pastorial experience. Echoes

The Sunday School has been in a contest with the Fifth and Peoria Assembly of Tulsa, and an attendance of 411 was reported at a recent session.

Since the last issue of the BUGLER, the enrollment of Southwestern has increased from 144 to 164, one of the new students, Norman Moffat, being from Canada.

An increasing interest has been manifested in bringing the full gospel to the surrounding towns. Besides the regular jail, shop, and street meetings, new preaching places have been opened up in Drummond, Hennessey, Bison, Isabel, and other places. A revival is being held at the Garber-Covington oil field assembly, W. O. Jackson a member of the graduating class is the pastor.

The various groups of the Student Missionary band have given some interesting programs at the regular Friday evening services. The following groups have already appeared; China, Palestine, South America, Africa, the World Group and India.

The District Presbyters of the Assembly of God of Oklahoma met here the 10 and 11 of March. They elected teachers for the ensuing year and attended to other business.

The present classroom space is already inadequate, and much more room will be needed next year. We need donations of money and skill-ed and unskilled labor at once to complete this work.
