## SBI MOVES FORWARD

### SOUTHWESTERN ADDS JR. COLLEGE

Perhaps the greatest and most far reaching thing that has occurred recently in connection with Southwestern Bible Institute is the decision of the officials of the Texas District Council made in a recent meeting in Fort Worth, Texas, to establish a Junior College at Southwestern Bible Institute next year.

The plan is to discontinue the ninth grade of the High School department and add the first year of the Junior College next year, then add the second year of the Junior College the following year. There are many reasons why this is being done.

There is a great need for a Junior College for Pentacostal young people here in the South. The expense of starting it will not be excessive since there are plenty of classrooms here not in use. The dormitory space now occupied by the ninth grade high school students can be filled with college students. The educational qualifications, age and general attitude of the first year college students will be nearer an equality with the Bible school student.

The college student will be free from the ungodly surrounding and unsaved teacher, found in many colleges today. Terminal education will be made possible and preparatory work will also be offered for those who desire to complete the last two years of college work in a 4 year college or university.

The instructors will have higher qualifications and since they will also instruct in the senior high school it will give the high school a better trained faculty.

# Strange Things Happen

SOMETIME ago a group of workmen in Rome were digging the foundation-work for a two-car garage. One near the center of the excavation suddenly threw up his arms and screamed. His friends looked, but to their amazement he was gone. Nothing was seen but a hole where he had been standing. A cave-in had occurred beneath his feet. He had fallen far below and lay groaning several feet beneath them.

Immediately men descended to his rescue. A rope was tied around the injured Italian and he was raised to the surface. The curious workmen, with their electric lights, began to explore the mysterious underground cave. They must have been alarmed beyond measure to discover themselves standing on the floor of an ancient church. How this church became buried in this manner they, of course, did not know. But the fact remained, it happened!

The auditorium was almost in perfect preservation. On one of its walls was a life sized portrait of St. Peter. The opposite wall contained a portrait of St. Paul. The paintings were by a Greek artist. It is believed by eminent Italian archaeologists that the apostles may have set for their portraits. The most interesting picture was on the panel of the transept; it was that of the twelve apostles with the Savior.

Only scientific observers have been permitted to explore this ancient edifice. Competent archaeologists have named it the "First Church of Rome." **STRANGE THINGS HAPPEN!**

Now you Latin students brush the cob-web from your memory. Can you recall the Tabularium, where the Archives of the Roman Republic were kept? Well, more than two stories of the old building now form the basement of the present Italian Capitol Building.

The thing I desire to say is this—archaeologists have been browsing around in some of these rooms (the building contains many secret rooms. Some have recently been opened and explored, but many have not as yet been found). They discovered an interesting and valuable document. Dr. J. O. Kinnaman said, "These reports were what would be called in the United States today, F.B.I. Reports."

It was the Emperor Justinian who, according to the document, sent his "F.B.I." men to Antioch, Syria to get the famed "holy grail"—the cup of the Last Supper. They arrived at the Church of Saint John, of Antioch where they interviewed the Church Sexton. When he refused to divulge any information regarding the whereabouts of the cup, he was brutally tortured in an effort to make him talk, but he refused.

The cup had been carried to Antioch by Saint Peter during the Jewish persecution of the Palestinian Christians, 36 A.D. The Roman "F.B.I." killed the Sexton but did not find the cup. They returned to Rome empty-handed.

In 1910 a Christian archaeologist, Dr. Eisen, was digging in Antioch near the old Church of Saint John. He discovered a beautiful silver Chalice—one of the most beautiful pieces of silversmith work, says Dr. Kinnaman, in the world—the work of a Greek silversmith. It was made some 17 years after the crucifixion of Jesus, or about 50 A.D.

It is adorned with the figures of the apostles to-

gether with that of Jesus all in semi-relief. But the interesting thing about the Chalice was what it contained. When it was opened, a silver cup, with a capacity of a little more than a quart, was found. Eleven pieces had been cut from its rim, evidently for souvenirs.

In the writings of such Christian archaeologists as Dr. J. O. Kinnaman you will find a fuller account of the above incidents, together with a wealth of other archaeological discoveries.

It is the consensus of Bible archaeologists that Dr. Eisen actually found the "Cup of the Last Supper." **STRANGE THINGS HAPPEN!**

About the time World War II started, Professor Gryaznov, of the Soviet Academy of Science of Eternal Frost made what is perhaps the strangest discovery ever made in Siberia.

He found 10 bay horses, saddled and bridled, with their eyes wide-open and every hair in place, standing in a barn made of axe hewn logs, partially buried in a deep layer of frozen sand and gravel. The location was near the north end of the Altai Mountains in Northern Siberia. As I understand it the barn was 50 feet beneath the surface buried in ice and sand.

Dr. Harold O. Whitnall, professor of Geology, of Colgate University, gave a description of the find in American Weekly, August 27, 1939.

I quote him: "The fact that these steeds were saddled and bridled would indicate that their owners were well aware of their peril, and ready to start on their flight south the moment the blinding blizzard should let up."

Christian thinkers are convinced that these horses were downed at the time of Noah's Flood along with the mammoths and the other animals. Like the mammoths the horses have half digested food in their stomachs. Many scholars believe that soon the house together with its occupants will be discovered.

Regarding the culture of that day Dr. Whitnall said, "The striking feature of these men is that, judged by the equipment on their horses, they belonged to a race of high-grade artists and artisans. The leather of their saddles is still splendidly preserved, and even the carved wood, when warmed up gave off an resinous odor. The wood, like the saddles and bridles, was handsomely inlaid with gold and tin foil, only slightly tarnished, after their long burial. Even the felt coverlets retain their color designs, such is the perfect preserving power of frost and darkness."

An interesting account of this can also be read in an article by B. F. Allen in the Signs of the Times, November 28, 1939. **STRANGE THINGS HAPPEN!**

There is a magazine called "The Protestant," which is neither Protestant nor Christian. It is sponsored by a group of socialists and radicals who bitterly oppose every distinctive doctrine of the Christian Religion. **STRANGE THINGS HAPPEN!**

An organization which has already put the Christmas and Easter programs out of some of the schools in America because of their hatred of Jesus Christ, is now sponsoring some 10,000 meetings of Christians and Jews in America every year. What is their purpose?

The false prophets in the days of Jeremiah and Isaiah hob-knobbed with the priests of Baal. So it is today! **STRANGE THINGS HAPPEN.**

Saint John said, "For many deceivers are entered into the world, who confess that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. This is a deceiver and an anti-

## Letters From Missionaries

Of much interest to their many friends will be the following letter from Sisters Lula M. Ashmore and Evelyn Hatchett, missionaries to the Chinese in Cuba who were sent forth from our Texas District the first of November.

Apartado 2101  
Havana, Cuba  
December 7, 1943

Dear friends in Christ:

When this letter reaches you, you will no doubt be already caught in the current of the Christmas Season's Activities, but we would like to claim a few minutes of your time and share with you some of the Season's Joys.

Since coming to Havana, and having the past month to make further investigations regarding the work among the Chinese, we are more encouraged than ever with the possibilities of a good work here. When we speak to the Chinese about starting a Church for them they manifest a very enthusiastic spirit.

The opportunities as seen here bring an enlargement of vision, but with the growing of the vision our responsibilities increase, and the attainment of the vision means real work. It means work in the studying of two foreign languages; work in preparing messages in harmony with the thought of a foreign mind; work in prevailing prayer, and work in contacting the people. But our trust is in Him who said, "Behold, I am the Lord, the God of all flesh. Is there anything too hard for Me?"

We have been able to find a building for the Church in an ideal location in the heart of China town. This was surely an answer to the many prayers which preceded our coming here. The Chinese man who helped us to locate the building made this statement, "I have known years to pass without a vacancy on the first floor of a building in Chinatown. Surely the Lord has blessed in preparing this place for you." This is the only building available. It has just been refinished both inside and outside, and rents for \$60.00 a month. It has a seating capacity of approximately one hundred.

At the present time we are making arrangements for the building of benches, and we trust to have all things in readiness so we can have the opening service sometime during Christmas Week. This will be one of our outstanding Christmas joys. We will be sharing with Christ in the joy He foresaw when He made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Himself the form of man; sharing in the joy that caused the heavenly hosts to swell the anthem of, "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men." O, beloved, God is letting us share in this joy! —bringing glad tidings of good things to this people here. Even now as we write our joy knows no bounds, and tears of gratitude fill the eyes.

May you rejoice abundantly in Elm during this Season, and we trust that you will not forget to pray earnestly for us as we labor here.

Christ . . . Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son. If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed: For he that biddeth him God speed is partaker of his evil deeds." (II John 7-11).

My Brethren in Jesus Christ, the Christian Religion is the only Divinely established religion on earth. It has the only Savior to offer to humanity. It is "THE WAY" and must stand alone. However, the Bible tells us that Christianity shall harlotize at the end of the age and unite with the false religions of the world: See Revelation 17.

Paul said that "God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: that they all might be damned who believe not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness." (II Thessalonians 2:11-12.) This includes all modernists, but many Fundamentalists, including some of the pool-playing, beach-loving preachers, will be caught in the Devil's snare.

**STRANGE THINGS HAPPEN:**

Fritz Kuhr, the Nazi Bundist, has been making Americans believe that to oppose Nazism makes one, not only a Communist, but a poor American; while Rex Stout and his Communistic gang are exposing anti-Socialists and anti-Communists as both un-American and Fascist. Of course, they dub militant Fundamentalists as Fascists.

My dear reader hear me as I speak from the depths of a burdened soul—burdened over the plight of the Church of Jesus Christ in this present world.
