- cause students to view their work as contributing to the cultural conversations in progress;
- help students discover the power of their own voices in writing and thinking;
- instill pride in the work students produce as they strive for excellence.

All of the above flow out of a deep respect for God's word and the intent to prepare students to have a ready response for skeptics – an articulate defense of the faith in our contemporary, postmodern world.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The English B.A. prepares students for a variety of professions: Education, publishing, journalism, and the arts are likely career opportunities, but English majors are sought after in all arenas. Graduates are able to demonstrate skills in communication, writing, researching, critical thinking, and empathy. The CEOs of major corporations have said they look for English majors because they're creative and think outside the box.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS
