### PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- A Senior Paper is required for this degree. The course THE 4150 Senior Paper is taken during the first semester of the senior year. The paper must be completed in a 3000 or 4000 level BIB, PHL, REL, or THE course. See the Department Chair for which courses qualify.
- Learn to read the Bible in its original languages and earn a minor in Biblical Languages by taking Greek 1 & 2, Hebrew 1 & 2, and Hermeneutics. There is enough room in our program for this or any other minor offered at SAGU, including business, education, music, digital media, marketing, psychology, coaching, and so forth.
- All graduates from our program are qualified to take the Assemblies of God Credentialing Exam. Our degree qualifies you to make application as a licensed minister.
- Our degree gives a special advantage to those preparing for further graduate studies and for employment in church and parachurch organizations, military and civilian chaplaincies, publishing houses, Bible software companies, denominational administration, missions organizations, and educational institutions.
